- 2) If you are reading the same book as someone else, write a script for one scene from the book. (You may wish to act it out for the class).
  
- 3) Create a comic strip about a scene from the book. Use color and dialogue bubbles like real comics.
  
- 4) Build a mini stage setting for one scene from the book. Be ready to tell us about the scene and why it was important in the story.
  
- 5) Make a puppet for the main character.
  
- 6) Design a new book cover for the book. Write 4-5 sentences about the book and give it a rating. Five stars is the best rating.
